# **Recycle Your Christmas Tree Into Useful Mulch**

It is always such a shame to see Christmas trees lying in the street on trash collection days. The City of Littleton will be offering free Christmas tree recycling at Cornerstone Park, 5150 South Windermere Street (corner of West Belleview Avenue and South Windermere Street) from December 26, 2021 to January 10, 2022. Access to the site is off of Windermere Street just south of Belleview, with the drop site in the parking lot adjacent to the soccer fields. The site is open from sunrise to sunset.

All decorations need to be removed from the tree, including lights, ornaments, garland, tinsel, and stands. If the tree is wrapped in a plastic bag, it must be removed at the drop off. Flocked or artificial trees and yard refuse will not be accepted. Many trash and waste removal companies either do not accept Christmas trees, or simply deposit them in landfills. So residents are encouraged to take advantage of this free program.

The trees will be chipped into mulch. Residents can obtain some of this mulch for free throughout the year as long as the supply lasts. You can call the City of Littleton at 303-795-3766 for more information.

## **Waste Connections Services for 2022**

Woodbourne has trash and recycling services provided for all homeowners by **Waste Connections of Colorado.** Our regular trash pick up days are Mondays. To ensure prompt pick-up for all Woodbourne residents, Waste Connections requests that all trash be at curbside by 7:00 a.m. on Mondays. Trash should not be put out earlier than one day before trash pick-up days.

All trash should be placed in the trash carts. Not accepted for pick up are soil, sod, rocks, uncut branches, bricks, concrete, building materials, auto parts, and hazardous waste.

Waste Connections observes six holidays each year: New Year's Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day, and Christmas Day. If one of these holidays falls on or before our regular collections day, pick-up will be made one day later that week. If the holiday falls on a Saturday or Sunday no change will occur. In 2022 because of these holidays, trash will be picked up on May 31 instead of May 30, on July 5 instead of July 4, and September 6 instead of September 5.

Waste Connections also collects recyclable trash through their single stream system. Recycling collection occurs every other week on the same day as trash collection. The list of recyclable products includes:

- Newspapers (including inserts)
- Magazines
- Catalogs
- · Telephone books
- · Corrugated cardboard
- Cereal boxes
- · Tube and core stock
- Junk mail
- Empty aerosol cans

- All other office paper without wax liners
- Aluminum food and beverage containers
- Glass food and beverage containers (clear, brown, or green)
- Ferrous (iron), bi-metal, and tin cans
- Plastic containers with the #1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, and 7 symbols

All recyclable fiber products must be dry and free from food debris or other contaminating material. Tissues, napkins, paper towels, pet food bags, or other paper that has been in contact with food are **not acceptable**.

All containers must be empty, free of metal caps, metal rings, plastic caps, and with less than 5% food debris. Specific materials that are **not accepted** are:

- Batteries
- Mirrors or plate glass
- Light bulbs
- Ceramics or porcelain
- · Window or auto glass
- Glass cookware or bakeware
- Microwave trays
- #7 PLA compostables

- Plastic bags or unnumbered plastic containers
- Containers that have held motor oil or hazardous waste
- Household items such as cooking pots or clothes hangers

The general rule is to rinse out the containers and remove the caps or tops. Then toss the containers into the recycling cart. Finally, get the cart to the curb by 7:00 a.m. on the recycling Mondays.

Waste Connections allows for additional trash collections over and above your weekly cart as follows:

- Leaf Season October 1st through December 1st each year Waste Connections will take up to 15 bags at no additional cost per week for leaf and yard clean up season.
- Holiday Season December 1st through January 15th Waste Connections will pick up any waste / trash associated with the holiday including holiday trees at no additional cost.

Woodbourne provides a large item trash pick once a year. This is an opportunity to get rid of old furniture, water heaters, and the like. If you have any questions, you can contact Waste Connections directly at

# **ACC Corner: Winter Watering**

If you are familiar with our climate in Denver, you know that we normally experience low precipitation, dry air and a fluctuating range of temperatures during our fall and winter months. As of Monday, November 22, 2021 Denver broke the record for the latest first snow of the season. The previous record was set November 21, 1934 during the Dust Bowl. With our already existing drought conditions, I thought some tips on winter watering would come in handy about now!

### First let's talk about when and how to water in general:

Of course, winter watering will be very different from your usual summer watering. It will take place less frequent-

ly and the time of day will also be different. When watering during late fall and winter, only water when the temperatures are above 40 degrees F and water during mid-day so the water can soak easily into the ground.



The amount of moisture you have received recently, other weather conditions such as wind, sunlight, and the location and exposure your plants receive. A good tip is to keep an eye on your weather conditions and water during extended dry periods without snow cover, one to two times per month. You may want to increase your watering if your plants have been exposed to dry wind conditions regularly. If the plants in question have a western or southern exposure, they will tend to dry out more quickly; same goes for plants receiving reflected heat from buildings, walls, and fences. So, adjust your watering accordingly.

When watering for trees and shrubs, consider their root systems. The vital root system of the average tree is equal to or greater than the height of the tree. Trees and shrubs with shallow root systems will benefit from supplemental winter watering. Some examples are birches, maples, linden, dogwoods, and willows. Evergreen trees and shrubs keep their foliage throughout the cold months and benefit greatly from supplemental watering. Some examples are spruce, arborvitae, boxwoods, mahonia, fir, and yew. It's also a good idea to give the foliage a spray on warm days to rid them from dust and debris.

Without supplemental water during the winter, herbaceous perennials, ground cover and lawns suffer from the constant freezing and thawing of the ground, which can create cracks that expose the roots to the winter elements

### All these plants have one thing in common:

The key to their survival during our harsh, dry winters is protecting their root systems. With perennials, ground covers and turf, avoiding root damage is key to their immediate survival. At the beginning of spring, you might not notice any difference, but once it warms up in early summer, parts of the plants may die, or the plant may not survive at all. You may see dead spots in your lawn and ground cover from winter root damage. With trees and shrubs, you may not notice anything immediately, but over several years, they will likely start showing stress. As with any plant that is not healthy and showing stress, they are highly susceptible to disease and insect damage. Supplemental fall and winter watering can help you avoid these problems and keep your plants happy and healthy.

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
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# **Kiwanis Club of Columbine: Local HS Key Clubs - Top Golf Fundraising Event**

## Winter Activities in Colorado Beyond the Ski Slopes

When winter's first snowflakes begin to blanket the ground in Colorado, it's the start of a joyous season for skiers and snowboarders at Colorado's 28 ski resorts. They're not the only outdoor adventurers who eagerly await the winter months.

### HOT SPRINGS

What better way to warm up than with a soak in an all-natural, mineral-water hot spring? Here, you'll have 29 to choose from, each with

its own charms. At Ouray Hot Springs Pool, unwind in the soothing waters with striking views of hulking snowcapped peaks. Clothing-optional Orvis Hot Springs in Ridgway boasts massaging waterfalls and lithium-water springs said to enhance your feelings of relaxation. Meanwhile, Iron Mountain Hot Springs in Glenwood Springs has 16 pools of steaming natural mineral waters, all of which vary in temperature.

### **ICE SKATING**

Enjoy some old-fashioned ice-skating fun at one of Colorado's many outdoor rinks. For an urban setting, visit the rinks in Fort Collins or Denver. Both are located in lively pedestrian areas and are surrounded by charming shops and cafes. For a more mountainous venue, glide over to 40-acre Evergreen Lake, west of Denver, where you can spin on the ice and then cozy up to the fireplace in the rink's warming hut. Keystone, Breckenridge, Beaver Creek, Vail, Lake City and Crested Butte are also favorite spots for a skate.

### HORSE-DRAWN SLEIGH RIDES

Warm, snuggle-ready blankets, crisp, winter air and the gentle jingle of bells tinkling to the rhythmic stride of strapping horses are hallmarks of Colorado sleigh rides. So are elegant dinners, local Colorado wines, convivial conversation, roaring fires and decadent desserts. Sleigh rides in Colorado are much more than circling around a track; they're fodder for vacation-defining moments and stories to share back home. Dude ranches, including those in Grand County and Steamboat Springs, are some of the best places to find fun sleigh rides.

### **SLEDDING/TUBING**

Bundle up the kids in hats and mittens and head for the hills—that's where you'll find plenty of sled- and tube-friendly terrain. It's hard for anyone not to emit a lighthearted giggle as you sail down the hill, catching a bit of air as you roll over gentle bumps. Try the hills at Vail, Keystone, Steamboat, Copper Mountain, Cuchara and Fraser. Lifts and tow ropes will lug your tube or sled to the top of the hills, giving you time for more runs.

### ICE FISHING

Sometimes the best parts of ice fishing have nothing to do with fish at all. Winter anglers reap some of the state's most placid rewards: quiet landscapes, glimpses of early-morning light shimmering off a lake's frozen ripples and solitary animal prints tracking across the surface. You can go the



basic route and just cut a hole, set up a chair and wait for a bite. Or for a more sophisticated approach, you can rent an ice-fishing cabin.
