It's finally, truly, pumpkin spice season. The pool resurfacing project has begun and final completion is scheduled for April 2023. The Board is also researching ADA alternative ladders to make sure Woodbourne's main asset is made accessible for all of our residents.

The Annual Hay Ride is scheduled for Friday, December 17, 2022, from 5:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. We have contracted two wagons, so there will be room for everyone! Please put this date on your calendars, prepare your favorite carols, and enjoy some community togetherness. This is by far our most costly social event,

so ensuring a strong turnout, will allow for future investment. In the past, this social event was operated as an open house. The clubhouse was open, neighbors brought cookies and cider, and some years, if he wasn't too busy, Santa Claus stopped by for a short visit.

> The Board is working diligently to prepare an HOA budget that addresses community needs for the next three, five, and ten years. Committee members serve on three year rolling terms, so we want to be sure we set up our successors and our resident's budgets for success. Thanksgiving Safety Tips Although Thanksgiving is a joyous time with family and friends (even our

Although Thanksgiving is a joyous time with family and friends (even our furry friends), this time of year is also associated with an increased risk of food poisoning. Everyone should take a few simple food safety precautions to prevent food poisoning. Keep meat, poultry, seafood, and eggs separate in your grocery bags, in the refrigerator and while preparing the meal. Remember to wash your hands, kitchen surfaces, utensils and cutting boards frequently, especially after handling or preparing uncooked food. Wash produce, but not eggs, meat, or poultry. Use the microwave, cold water, or refrigerator method to defrost your frozen meat or poultry. Do not thaw on the counter and be sure to cook immediately after thawing. Following these simple tips can prevent unfortunate problems from happening.

Many people also want to share the holiday with their pets. But not every Thanksgiving dish is safe for pets. Avoid the following foods that can cause problems for animals: bread dough, cake batter, onions and garlic, Sage, raisins and grapes, walnuts and macadamia nuts, chocolate, Xylitol, avocados, beer or other alcoholic beverages, and caffeine. If a pet ingests something harmful over the holidays, owners should call their vet immediately or call the 24/7 pet poison hotline at 888-426-4435 run by the ASPCA.

our recent Homeowners Reserve Budget study. The study is published on the Woodbourne website. We completed the major tree trimming throughout the neighborhood, replaced cracked and unsafe cement work around the pool gate, and are resurfacing the lap and wader pools. The completion of the resurfacing project will allow for at least fifteen years of summer enjoyment before we would need to look at another betterment project. The recent replacement of the main pool boiler ensures that we should not need major investments in the pool for some time.

We will be signing a new pool management/lifeguard contract in 2023 and intend to ensure our new provider is invested in Woodbourne as a partner, so they can communicate pool needs proactively and in a way that can be allocated into our budgets.

After receiving notice from CLA that they will again be substantially increasing their fees, the Board is investigating other property management companies in hopes of obtaining the same or better service at a more cost appropriate level.

Your Fall To-Do List

Make sure to prep your home before the weather changes. You probably give your home a deep clean in the spring, but you should also show it some love at the beginning of fall. Here's where to start:

1. Perform a pantry audit. First, remove all the cans and boxes from the shelves, and vacuum away any lingering dust or crumbs (a lot can build up in just a few months!). Then, inspect each item before putting it back in its place, tossing anything that is expired or past its prime.

2. Test and clean your smoke detectors. You already know to put fresh batteries in your smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors. But you also need to


> clean your units, since dust can cause them to under-perform. Using your vacuum cleaner's soft brush attachment, clean in and around the detectors' openings. If any are more than 10 years old, replace them.

> 3. Flip your mattress. When you turn back your clocks, turn your mattress over, too. If you can't flip it because it has a pillowtop, rotate it 180 degrees to prevent body impressions form causing certain spots to slump. Sprinkle the mattress with baking soda to neutralize odors, and then vacuum it up.

4. Shampoo your carpet. Get a jump on holiday party season by giving your carpeting a good scrub. We recommend getting a professional cleaning once a year, but you can also do a good job by renting a carpet cleaner.

5. Vacuum all upholstered surfaces. You think your couch is clean untill you plop on it, and a haze of dust appears around you. Give sofas and chairs a good vacuuming, making sure to hit both sides of the cushions, the back, sides, arms, and even the platform underneath the cushions.





YourJeffco App

Allows Citizens to Submit Road Maintenance Requests

Jefferson County is excited to announce the implementation of a new website and app, YourJeffco, that enables citizens, visitors, and business owners in the county to report issues and concerns about roads and bridges maintained by Jefferson County (outside of city limits in unincorporated Jeffco). Reporting a pothole, flooded road, downed tree, graffiti, or scores of other issues is now as simple as pulling out a smartphone. https://www.jeffco.us/4492/YourJeffco

YourJeffco integrates directly with the county's citizen request management software, QAlert. This integration allows users to submit

comments and photos when notifying Jefferson County staff about an issue. Through YourJeffco, those submissions are then routed to appropriate departments or individuals for handling and resolution. Once your request is submitted, you can receive updates (via text, email or phone) while requests are addressed and resolved.
